"Details"

There is an old proverb which reminds us, "the devil is in the details." I'm sure all of us have heard it. I'm also fairly certain, all of us have had the rude awakening when we overlooked one or more details. We were shocked to find there was just one more thing to do, one more step to be completed, one more part to be tightened. The shock was particularly painful when we thought we were finally done.

Recently I have come very close to relandscaping the parsonage backyard. For the last several weeks I thought I saw the light at the end of the tunnel. I was wrong. There was always one more thing to do. One small step to be completed. One detail to be addressed. Painfully I learned, you never overlook the smallest of details, because this is where a bigger problem may originate.

The devil is in the details. This proverb could apply to the work Jesus did as our Savior. From the time of the fall and the first sin, God carefully crafted his plan for the rescue of all people. That plan started simply, "the seed of the woman would crush the serpent's head." Subsequent details were added generation after generation until the entire plan was complete. When "the set time had fully come, God sent his Son to be born of a woman, so that he would be born under the law" (Galatians 4:4).

Jesus had the incomprehensible task of fulfilling every requirement God set forth in the Scriptures. This included the perfect completion of the Law and the Prophets. It also included a life free from spot, stain and accusation. There were no short-cuts. There were no steps which could be omitted or substituted. There were no insignificant or trite details.

Jesus completed every righteous requirement. Along the way benchmarks were provided. At his baptism and transfiguration God the Father proclaimed, "This is my Son, whom I love, with him I am well pleased." At his ascension, when Jesus returned to take his place at the right hand of his Father, the final exclamation point was provided. All was complete. Not one detail was overlooked. The rescue of all people, for all time was secure.

For you and me, as well as every believer, this is a precious truth. We are by nature incomplete in all we say and do. We are also ready and willing to overlook a few details because it would make everything we do easier. This will never accomplish anything with God. In fact, it separates us even more completely when we believe good enough is acceptable to God. We need to be perfect in everything and in every way in order to be saved. This is why only faith in Jesus can save. He accomplished everything we couldn't, or didn't want to do. As a result, we live with confidence and peace that we are saved by grace through faith in Jesus alone. This is a truth to be savored and treasured.

The devil is in the details. This proverb applies to another aspect of our life. It is

the work we do as a congregation of believers, and it follows that two questions need to be asked: what is *our* ministry as a gathering of believers in Jesus; and, what is *my* ministry in that gathering? Both of these questions are based on unique details.

As a gathering of believers our ministry is straightforward. When Jesus ascended into heaven he said, "Go and make disciples of all nations." The only way this is accomplished is through the gift of Baptism and the teaching which comes from the Word of God. There is no other way to make disciples than through the Gospel.

You could think of it this way. Try answering the question—what is our ministry—without the directive given by Jesus. It might sound something like this. Our congregation's ministry is to feed the hungry, provide housing for the homeless, build houses in South America, promote social justice and equality, save the environment. All of these are arguably noble causes. Some could even become useful bridges to connect people to Jesus. Still, in and of themselves, they do nothing to accomplish the ministry of reconciliation God gave his church. Yes, the devil is in the details, and the one detail which can never be overlooked or assumed is Jesus' Church exists to make more disciples.

Now, the second question still looms. What is my ministry or role in the work of Christ's Church, namely the gathering of believers we call Our Redeemer? One could say, this is where the rubber meets the road.

Personal ministry is just what its name implies—personal. It is specific to each of us as members of the Church. We know from Scripture each of us has been blessed with gifts by the Holy Spirit, so we can be an effective part of the overall work of the church. We also know from experience here is where the devil is the most active, and sometimes the most effective. His desire is that none of us recognize our role in the ministry of the church. If that doesn't work, then he makes us doubt our ability to serve. To both of these he further adds the deception, you are really not that important. As I said, the devil is in the details, and the one significant detail we can never overlook is how important it is for each of us to participate in the ministry of the Church.

It is easy to succumb to the temptation that if I go to church every once in a while, I'm doing my duty. In addition, if I attend an event when there is nothing else better to do, then I've more than done my fair share. How sad, and how unfortunate.

Remember what Paul said, "you are the body of Christ and individually you are the members of it" (I Corinthians 12:12-31). We all have a role, the place where we serve. And, let's be honest, the more people who do serve, the more work gets done. Furthermore, the ones who are already faithfully serving will not be overwhelmed with all there is to do, or possibly suffer burn out.



Serving takes an increased level of commitment. Time and effort are

always precious commodities, but what is the best way to use these gifts? A good starting point might be to recognize my time, my abilities, and every opportunity I have to serve is a gift from God. In love and thanks I will want to serve with gratitude and appreciation, and in faithfulness.

Yes, the devil is in the details. He will always be lurking to make us think everything is impossible. There is too much to do. And, there is nothing I can really do. Here is when we need to turn to our Savior who gives us his own blood-bought assurance, he can "do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:30).

"Meaningless! Meaningless!" says the Teacher. "Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless." Ecclesiastes 1:2

Through Jesus we have the peace of forgiveness. Through Jesus we have an unsurpassed joy. Through Jesus we are set apart for a blessed life now, and in heaven.

This needs to be our final goal in the search for a meaningful life. Only Jesus can give lasting glory. Only Jesus can give lasting honor. Only Jesus can give lasting treasures. Even more important, what he offers never diminishes in time or throughout eternity. This is why we look to the Lord to be freed from a meaningless life, and live a life that is truly meaningful.
