"Moral Centric Software"

Just a little over two weeks ago, I read an article in the Santa Barbara News-Press. In bold letters it was titled, "UCSB professor and team creates moral-centric software." Naturally the headline caught my attention and peaked my curiosity. The article explained how a program was designed to determine a moral foundation which would unite people rather than divide them.

The task to create such a program began against a backdrop of accepted morals fairness and cheating; harm or care for other people; sensitivity to authority or not adhering to an authority; loyalty or disloyalty; purity and impurity. These moral foundations were evaluated by 800 coders who answered specific questions about each. The last step measured the weight differences each of the coders assigned to a specific area (i.e. one person may hold fairness higher than adhering to authority). The end result was a program which combined computer algorithms with text mining and evaluations of the 800 coders. Or, as it is described moral centric software. The purpose of this is to help people understand there is not a good morality or a bad morality. Moral sensitivities are just differently distributed and this acknowledgement allows for common ground.

If you have a hard time sorting through all this, that makes two of us. I found the entire idea and practice rather confusing, and even a little troubling. My initial concern is that this is nothing more than morality by committee. Yes, there were 800 people recording their impressions. Still, even though the 800 coders came from different backgrounds and different moral beliefs, they maintained a common bias.

Consider what the Lord says about the sinner and the sinner's heart. "To be sure, out of the heart come evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, sexual sins, thefts, false testimonies, and blasphemies. These are the things that defile a person" (Matthew 15:19). We also know "the mindset of the sinful flesh is hostile to God, since it does not submit to God's law, and in fact, it cannot. Those who are in the sinful flesh cannot please God" (Romans 8:7,8). There are numerous additional passages which reveal the natural human condition. Consequently, although there are 800 coders working independently, each offering a particular moral view, the results are flawed because people are flawed. Now, if you attempt to average or weight each response, what will the results be? What could possibly come from sinful human beings creating a moral-centric software program? If the thought of this doesn't trouble you, it should.

Just look at the rationalizations, clarifications, and justifications we can make at the drop of a hat. All of them sound feasible. All of them offer something more desirable. Still, what does my subjective morality have to do with God's objective morality?

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Any hint of an objective truth was strangely missing from the article. Yes, the proposal was to come to some form of an objective understanding, but drawing it from an averaging of subjective responses doesn't seem to provide anything which could be called objective. Maybe that's why the concept of moral centric software sounds so appealing. It would allow you to set your own standards based on your delineation of what is good morality or what is bad morality. Our Lord has something completely different in mind. This was already stated at the foot of Mount Sinai.

When the Lord rescued the people of Israel from slavery in Egypt, he brought them to his holy mountain. There he handed down not only the Ten Commandments, he also provided them with everything which became the foundation for his covenant with them. It was comprehensive. It was clear and without question. It was impossible to argue with what he revealed. Now that didn't mean the people of Israel received the commandments with joyful, willing and faithful obedience. They reinterpreted what God gave them. They bristled with anger at his commands. They rebelled against everything that was for their good. The end result was they were held accountable for their sin against God's Law.

This reveals the inherent weakness of the moral centric software. If anything, it would allow a person to believe what is fine for you is fine for you, and what is fine for me is fine for me. This outcome has to be accepted because it is part of the overall premise—there is no good morality and there is no bad morality. There is a word which ultimately describes this reality—chaos.

A much better source for morals is what the Lord offers us in his Word. Sure many people would argue that Judeo-Christian principles are no better than any other. Consider this. Which other law code or covenant was divinely inspired, divinely recorded, and divinely demanded a standard of perfection? There are other law codes recorded throughout the millennia, but all were products of human beings—Law Code of Hammurabi (Babylon), Doctrines and Covenants (LDS), and Koran (Islam). Each had a human author, and surprisingly each changed as times and people changed. God's Law never changes because God never changes. God's Law stands unaffected by changing times and morals.

This consistency is what provides us with a sure and solid foundation. We always know where we stand with God. We also know what he has done to provide the guidance we need for life. There is nothing left to chance. Nothing left to personal interpretation. Nothing left to figure out. What the Lord says is complete and withstands the test of time.

Moral centric software. It sounds interesting, possibly even helpful. It might answer some lingering questions and long-standing debates. It might even lead to agreement in regard to morality. Unfortunately, it can and will never answer what is the most important question, "What must I do to be saved?"

This is why we hold to the Word and will of our Lord. Not only is it a lamp to our feet and a light for our path, it is the good news of forgiveness and perfect righteousness through which we are saved.



O God, root out all heresy, and of false teachers rid us who proudly say, "Now where is he who shall our speech forbid us? By right or might we shall prevail; what we determine cannot fail; we want no lord or master!"

Defend your truth, O God, and stay this evil generation, and from the error of its way keep your own congregation. The wicked everywhere abound and would your little flock confound,

but you are our salvation!

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Third Quarter Financial Report



It is the end of the third quarter 2019 and I would like to provide a brief financial report on the how we are performing relative to the 2019 approved budget, and relative to the same period last year.

Through the third quarter of 2019, offerings for the General Fund, excluding special fund offerings for things like Synod Mission support, Grounds, California Lutheran High School, etc., were \$104,112 which was about \$6,164 short of our General Fund budget of \$110,275. During the same period, our total expenses were \$109, 212 which was \$4,464 less than the \$113,676 we budgeted.

If we subtract the expenses from the offerings we get a decrease in the General Fund, again as of the third quarter 2019, of \$5,100. On a year over year basis, we have had a balance in the General Fund at the end of September 2018 of \$42,006. At the end of September 2019, the General Fund balance was \$36,927.

The Church Council is closely watching the expenses and have managed, as mentioned above, to keep them well under the 2019 approved budget. However, General Fund offerings have not kept pace with the approved budget, seeing an average shortfall of about \$700 per month in 2019.

Please prayerfully consider the importance of the ministry of Our Redeemer in your daily lives, and the blessings we all receive from membership in a church that preaches and teaches the pure word of God to an increasingly hostile and dying world. May God grant that we all ponder the tremendous price that was paid by our Savior Jesus Christ for our eternal salvation, and plan our giving according to the rich grace we have received.





Reformation Celebration

This year we will watch the DVD—<u>The Impact of the Reformation</u> <u>Today</u>. It was produced by Concordia Seminary in observance of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation (1517-2017). The film is described in this way: "A lone monk's actions 500 years ago continue to have a great impact. In this presentation, renowned Luther scholars from around the world reveal how the Reformation surrounds us more than we realize through religion, politics and our society. A Patient Life

Brothers and sisters, as an example of patience in the face of suffering, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord. As you know, we count as blessed those who have preserved . . The Lord is full of compassion and mercy.

James 5:10-11
