"Social Justice and Jesus"

Prior to Jesus' crucifixion and death, Caiaphas the high priest said, "You know nothing at all. You do not even consider that it is better for us that one man die for the people than that the whole nation perish" (John 11:50). It was an unusual prophecy, yet it revealed a stunning truth. It was also taken completely out of context.

Caiaphas and the members of the Sanhedrin saw this as the perfect opportunity to execute Jesus. According to them he was stirring up too much trouble and creating riots all over Palestine. From their perspective, in order to keep Rome from destroying the Jewish nation Jesus had to die. It was necessary. It was expedient. It was duly executed.

It is with great chagrin that we consider these events. Organized religion was corrupt. Civil authority was abused. People were uninformed and ignorant. This became the perfect storm which brought Jesus before Pilate and which sealed his crucifixion. All along the way, the jeering crowds protested, "Crucify him! Crucify him!"

2000 years later we are troubled by this series of events. Yet we also recognize it was God's will for Jesus to suffer, be crucified, and rise on the third day. As we consider what happened to Jesus, there are some observations we can make which are valuable in the light of what we see happening today.

Recently there has been a clamor for social justice. If you listen to what many are saying, this is what the country needs, and right now! Personally I am confused by the term, because it lacks a clear definition. Justice maintains rights afforded to citizens by the Constitution and the Bill of Rights. These are clearly enumerated and defined. The confusion comes when the word social is attached. From what I can gather—and I could certainly be wrong—society has to determine what justice should look like.

Now, this sounds agreeable, fair, even attractive. There is a problem, however. When society determines what justice should be, does it actually have the qualifications needed to determine what is just or unjust, right or wrong? For example take society's questionable value of life. People are less and less sensitive to the horrors of taking a human life. Violence is glorified. Vengeance is justified. Society cannot meet the challenge of determining what is just or unjust, because people are evil by nature. What else could come out of hearts which are filled with "evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, sexual sins, thefts, false testimonies and blasphemies" (Matthew 15:19).

Consequently, what kind of justice could a naturally evil society maintain or uphold? It would be at best a sliding scale of justice, but it would never ascend. It

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would be in a constant state of decline. This was why Jesus was rejected. He refused to meet society's standards to provide justice. It became necessary for Jesus to die, so a different standard could be pursued—one more in keeping with what society demanded.

To be perfectly candid, we easily fall into the same trap. We try to put God's justice on a sliding scale. We want God's standards to conform to ours. The result is shocking and shameful. Because we are evil by nature, we expect God to become more tolerant of us and our evil. This is not justice. Nor is it something we should desire or demand.

One of God's many attributes is justice. He is holy and holds all accountable for not attaining holiness. This results in an eternity of separation from him—which is only just. Society, and we must include ourselves as part of society, bristles at the notion. We expect God to adapt to the times. We expect him to be more enlightened. We expect God to be more sensitive to the plight of human kind. Now this could result in a socially acceptable message, but it would hardly be just.

This is why we are grateful God doesn't change, nor will he ever change. His standard of justice will always be maintained consistently and objectively. Consequently, we always know where we stand with God. At the same time, we also rejoice to know God meted out his justice on his Son. Jesus endured the full weight of God's justice upon our sin. He suffered unjustly and intensely so that justice could be maintained. In enduring God's just sentence, he also revealed pure and undeserved love. As a result of Jesus' precious work we are declared not guilty. Not because the sentence was reduced, or a plea bargain was reached. Nor did God yield to the cries of social justice protestors. We are declared justified through faith in Jesus.

This for you and me needs to be the starting point when we entertain any discussion about justice. Ultimately society, that is sinful people, can never and will never arrive at a proper understanding of what justice should be. It is impossible to comprehend true, divine and error-free justice. In contrast, as believers in our Savior—people who have been declared not guilty—we know what justice is. God alone determines what that should be, and what the consequences should be. While it may be terrifying to stand beneath God's justice, we know where peace can be found. It is only through Jesus who was crucified because of society's justice that we are delivered from divine justice. It makes one think. It also makes one praise the Lord for what he has done.



Justification Lies Outside of Us, and In Christ

A Christian is righteous and holy by an alien or foreign holiness—I call it this for the sake of instruction —that is, he is righteous by the mercy and grace of God. This mercy and grace is not something human; it is not some sort of disposition or quality in the heart. It is a divine blessing, given us through the true knowledge of the Gospel, when we know or believe that our sin has been forgiven through the grace and merit of Christ.

Is not this righteousness an alien righteousness? It consists completely in the indulgence of another and is a pure gift of God, who shows mercy and favor for Christ's sake, . . . Therefore a Christian is not formally righteous; he is not righteous according to substance or quality—I use these words for instruction's sake. He is righteous according to his relation to something: namely, only in respect to divine grace and the free forgiveness of sins, which comes to those who acknowledge their sin and believe that God is gracious and forgiving for Christ's sake, who was delivered for our sins (Romans 4:25) and is believed in by us.

Streaming Continues

Since the end of February we have been video streaming our worship services. It has allowed us to meet the needs of our people who are home bound. Now that the "stay at home" orders are being lifted for church services, the question might be asked, "will the streaming continue?" The answer is yes.

Since our first service we have taken the time to acquire all the needed equipment to produce a quality stream long term. With a few exceptions, we have done remarkably well in a short time.

One of the last remaining pieces was to evaluate our audio reproduction capacity. When the PA system was originally set up, the thought never surfaced we would be live streaming. Consequently, the system did two things. One was to amplify the sound in the church, and the second was to record an audio file for the website. Little did we realize what would happen. Over the past few months we have experimented with different input configurations. Last Sunday was a marked improvement, but it was not a lasting solution. That has been resolved this week.

While not ready for this Sunday, we have purchased a new console mixer. It will simplify wiring, and will improve the overall quality and distribution of the sound. We look forward to its installation, and to maintaining the high standards we have set for our program.
