"What's Next"

If you've been following the events of the past several months, I'm sure you have asked the question, "what's next?" We can agree the pandemic which shut down the economy and everything else was bad enough. Now add to this the resulting plateau and current resurgence, the question naturally follows. Finally, add to all this the chaos from the protests, you can't help but wonder, what's next?

As we look at everything that has happened, and continues to take place, we might echo the words of the psalmist, "how long, O Lord, how long?" Many people conclude we have been through more than enough. Unfortunately, things will get worse.

Now, you may brand me as a pessimist, but I am definitely a realist. No, I do not have a crystal ball through which I can see the future. I do, however, have a source of unique and very reliable information. Oddly enough, it is the same source each of us has through the Bible. While it may seem sad to acknowledge it, Scripture does offer a fairly bleak picture of what the future holds.

Consider Matthew 24: ⁴ Jesus answered them, "Watch out that no one deceives you. ⁵ Because many will come in my name, saying, 'I am the Christ,' and they will deceive many people. ⁶ You will hear of wars and rumors of wars. See that you are not alarmed, because all these things must happen; but that is not yet the end. ⁷ Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places. ⁸ But all these things are only the beginning of birth pains. ⁹ Then they will hand you over to be persecuted, and they will put you to death. You will be hated by all nations because of my name. ¹⁰ Then many will fall away from faith. They will betray each other and hate each other. ¹¹ Many false prophets will appear and deceive many people. ¹² Because lawlessness will increase, the love of many will grow cold. ¹³ But whoever endures to the end will be saved.

Shortly before his crucifixion and resurrection, Jesus warned his disciples what the end times would look like. Suffice it to say, these same warnings are still relevant. In addition, we can never forget the words spoken by Paul: "our salvation is nearer than when we first believed." Simply put, every day will become more taxing, yet every day becomes more joyous because we are one step closer to heaven.

We have to keep both of these passages in view, otherwise we will be deceived by the devil. His purpose is to make us gravitate from one extreme to another. On the one end of the spectrum is despair—things are so out of control that even God can't do anything about them. On the other end, is the cavalier attitude which maintains everything is fine and I can keep doing whatever I want. Neither of these is what the Lord wants for us.


The words of Matthew 24 are like sign posts. They tell us where we are, and they encourage us to keep moving forward. These signs are particularly helpful right now. Instead of being preoccupied with what might happen next, our Savior in his love says, keep watching, keep working, and keep on fighting. We should never focus on a singular event and say, "Aha!" We need to look at the collective picture and conclude, it is just as the Lord said it would be. There is a benefit to this collective view of all the signs. It reminds us that the end will come, but only as the Lord deigns and designs. It also reminds us how devoted he is to our care—temporally and spiritually. Even in the middle of a complete lack of spirituality and morality, our Lord continues to love us and remains our Refuge, our Fortress, and our Help who is always there in every time of trouble.

Personally, I find these words extremely comforting. Nothing can dim or erase the truth God is always in control. Nor can anything separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Savior. This is a precious truth. It is the foundation of our faith. It is the source of our hope-filled joy. Even in the most turbulent and darkest of times our Lord's promise, his presence, and his power remain unchanged. So, while we may be tempted to wonder, what's next, or we might even be paralyzed by fear and uncertainty, God knows and tells each of us to trust him.

And why shouldn't we trust him! Certainly we have his assurance he will take care of us daily and richly.

We have his unfailing promise that heaven is there and is prepared for us. What gives us even more reason to trust the Lord is the great lengths he went to show us his love. That love was revealed in the Savior he sent to take on our humanity and complete the righteous requirements of his law. It was further revealed in our Savior's humble obedience to put himself under the just condemnation and eternal separation we deserved. It was perfectly revealed in his glorious resurrection which proclaims all is complete and we are bound for eternal life in heaven. If this is what God has done to rescue us from death and the devil's domination, how can we possibly think he will not safely see us through a pandemic! How will he not keep us safe through anarchy and turmoil! How will be not graciously give us all things!

So, what's next? It all depends on whom you choose to believe. You could turn to politicians, but they are constantly maneuvering with every wind of public opinion. You could turn to the designated experts, but their level of certainty changes like the weather. You could turn to the Lord, and know you will always get the truth. Our



God does not change. He never fails to love us, or do what is best for us. This is the safest, and most reliable place to put your trust.

It is for this very reason that we need to commit two precious passages to memory. The first is, "trust in the Lord and lean not on your own understanding." The second is, "commit your way to the Lord, trust in him, and he will make everything work out well." These provide the evidence we need to put our trust in the Lord. They tell us we will never be put to shame or embarrassed because we trusted him. They also tell us the Lord will never fail. He will never forget his redeemed. He will never forget you and me. Consequently, we can take our Savior's exhortation to heart— "do not worry about tomorrow!" Certainly the Lord knows what we need, and what will happen next.

Outreach Opportunities

Devotional Corner

"The Simple Truth"

He [Jesus] went in and said to them, "Why all the commotion and wailing? The child is not dead but asleep." But they laughed at him. *Mark 5:39-40*

The world rejects the message of Jesus Christ. What is worse, it even ridicules what Jesus taught. When I see this reaction, why should I be surprised if I receive the same response. It is an important lesson to remember. It is especially important to remember as I live by faith and give a confident witness before all.

It is a challenge not to want to hide my faith, or to try to blend in with the world as much as possible. Maybe a don't ask, don't tell policy would get me through the difficult times. Maybe I should just follow the crowd and reject and ridicule the message of Jesus.

The simple truth is, I need to follow my Savior and confess him boldly regardless of the response of others. I need to understand that every day I am on this earth is one more day the Lord has given me to live to his glory and praise. It is also one more day to prepare myself to stand before him. On the last day, I alone will have to provide an explanation of my life. There is only one hope I have, and that is to confess Jesus for what the Scriptures reveals him to be. He is the Son of God sent to this earth. He is the Redeemer who paid the price to release me from the devil's bondage. He is the Savior who rescued me from death and the grave. This is the simple truth I need to believe and confess throughout my life.

Yes, it may prove to be a challenge to make this kind of confession. I may be subject to ridicule. I may be rejected by my family and friends. I may even be tempted to question if it is worth the effort and the sacrifice. Once again, I need to understand the simple truth. Just as Jairus saw the glory of Jesus as the Son of God in bringing his daughter back to life, so will I see the glory of Jesus in my resurrection on the last day. I will see him as he truly is, and I will receive the gift of eternal life in heaven.
