"Moving Indoors"

On November 1st, Reformation Sunday, we will transition back to indoor worship. While we have enjoyed excellent weather and beautiful surroundings, there is a change in the air. Cooler and damper conditions are going to become more common. Perchance, we might even have rain. I am grateful for all who made the outdoor experience so positive. I have even heard several comments proposing we do this regularly every summer. I, for one, wouldn't oppose it.

I know some may welcome the move indoors, and it does offer some advantages. Still, it is not going to be without some precautions and compromise. The precautions were shared at the last congregational meeting (cf. page 4). Most are common sense and fall within established guidelines for safe gatherings. Granted, there is a continuing debate over the efficacy regarding some of the precautions, particularly masks. We could question the purpose and wisdom of them. However, is this the most productive use of our time and energy - debating the use of masks? Somehow, engaging in a debate about this one facet could sidetrack us from what is really important. It could also become a tool in the hand of the devil to divide us. This is the last thing we need at such a tenuous time. What do we gain if we start demanding one way is better and refusing to listen to another person's concern? Wouldn't we become like many in the world with mouths open and ears shut? Personally, I am not a big fan of wearing a mask. Yet, out of concern for those around me I will wear one once we move inside. If it allays fears and builds up a spirit of unity and selfless love, why not!

There are other precautions we will enlist such as disinfecting "touchable" surfaces, cleaning more thoroughly, improving air circulation, having hand wipes and sanitizer available, and so on. Ultimately, there is no harm in doing any of this.

I suppose the question could be raised, "don't you trust God to keep you healthy?" This question parallels the one posed to Jesus regarding the "greatest" commandment (Matthew 22:34-40). Most people in the congregation would readily say, "we trust the Lord." At the same time we do not go out of our way to tempt the Lord. I don't ride my bicycle down the middle of the street, or cross an intersection with my eyes closed trusting God will keep me safe from my negligence. God doesn't promise to keep us safe when we put him to the test (Matthew 4:5-7). So, if wearing a mask and using other precautions can offer some help, why disregard them? We do have some people in our congregation with compromised immune systems and preexisting conditions. Should we tell them, don't come because I don't want to wear a mask? Should we maintain our freedom and possibly cause them to get something even as simple as the flu? Should we assume they are the ones with the problem? Stop for a moment and consider, is this what our Savior's selfless love looks like? I can demand my rights,

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or I can even say I won't come if I have to wear a mask, but how does this reflect the love of Christ which unselfishly rescued an undeserving wretch like me?

This is what is actually at stake. Yes, we can talk about the orders from the County Health Department and others in authority. We can even look at the recently enacted fines which could be levied against groups that are too large. This is not why we do what we do. As Paul reminds us, we are constrained by the love of Christ. This means if someone we call sister or brother is struggling or apprehensive about being infected by COVID, we don't blow them off or insist on our rights to do what we want. God help us if this is what we have allowed ourselves to become. The world and Satan have claimed us and the victory.

We know we live in a sinful world. We know there will be challenges, threats and obstacles. We al-

ways need to keep in mind the words of our Savior, "We are in the world, but we are not of the world." Jesus was very explicit in what he meant. As his disciples, we are in this world for better or for worse. What happens around us does have an effect on us. We struggle with unjust laws and mandates. We grow weary with questionable decisions. We see our hopes crushed under burdensome restrictions. We are in the world, and the Prince of this World is going to make life as miserable as possible. At the same time, we are not to be controlled or overcome by the world. Nor should we ever permit the deceptive marks of the world define us.



Now some may interpret this as a reason to throw away every mask one owns, because we are not going to be of the world. This is foolishness. We maintain a delicate balance between being good citizens of the earthly kingdom and good citizens of our Savior's heavenly kingdom. One doesn't release us from the other, nor does one preclude the other. Remember our lives are about bringing glory to God in everything we do. As disciples and witnesses of our Savior, "we give to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's." As I said, it is a delicate balance. When we begin scoffing at the authority God has placed over us and deciding what we will obey and when, we can also show our disdain for the Lord. We dare never forget, the "authorities that do exist have been established by God" (Romans I3:I-2). What completes and balances this understanding is what Peter and John said when they were told by the authorities to stop proclaiming the Gospel: "We must obey God rather than men." They declared this knowing full well it could have meant their lives. The question we have to ask is wearing a mask equivalent with the explicit order not to proclaim the Gospel?

The times in which we find ourselves call for balance and the art of compromise. No, we will never compromise our teaching of God's Word, or the faith in Jesus which saves us. To do so is to go against conscience and God's will. Nor will we ever compromise the Gospel ministry of our congregation. It will always be a hospital where sin-sick souls can receive the precious healing of forgiveness and peace for their weary souls. After this, there is a great deal of wiggle room. This can include extra spacing between people, extra cleaning, and anything else we can do to keep the doors open - which can also include wearing a mask. Please understand, if our willingness to wear a mask for an hour or so allows us to keep our doors open, isn't it worth the minor inconvenience? It should be seen as an investment which will pay dividends in working back to a complete ministry. I know this is what I long for, am willing to work for, and yes, even sacrifice for.

There is so much more at stake than a mask or no mask. If we allow our discourse to be only about our freedom, or the lack thereof, we are deceiving ourselves. There are precious, blood bought souls involved. In this time when there is so much uncertainty and division, we need to do everything we can to

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increase unity through the bond of peace. If this means a little inconvenience, so be it. It is not like we haven't been forewarned about it in this life. Recall I Peter 1:3-9:

³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he gave us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴ into an inheritance that is undying, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you. ⁵ Through faith you are being protected by God's power for the salvation that is ready to be revealed at the end of time.

⁶ Because of this you rejoice very much, even though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been grieved by various kinds of trials ⁷ so that the proven character of your faith—which is more valuable than gold, which passes away even though it is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise, glory, and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed.

⁸ Though you have not seen him, you love him. Though you do not see him now, yet by believing in him, you are filled with a joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory, ⁹ because you are receiving the goal of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

The Apostles' words are noteworthy. A little inconvenience now will eventually lead to a greater joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory. When you consider everything from that perspective, isn't this what we want to practice and pursue? I believe this is the very reason why our Lord has put us here, and keeps us here, especially during this pandemic.

It is the duty both of preachers and of hearers first of all and above all things to see to it that they have clear and sure evidence that their doctrine is really the true Word of God, revealed from heaven to the holy, original fathers, the prophets and apostles, and confirmed and commanded to be taught by Christ Himself. For we should by no means ever let doctrine be manhandled according to the pleasure and fancy of the individual who adapts it to human reason and understanding. Nor should we let men toy with Scripture, juggle the Word of God, and make it submit to being explained, twisted, stretched, and revised to suit people or to achieve peace and union; for then there could be no secure or stable foundation on which consciences might rely.

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"An Ounce of Prevention"

At the last congregation meeting, Pastor Proeber outlined the necessary precautions which were going to be enacted as we move indoors on November 1st. All of these are common sense, and will help us get back to a more normal ministry in the future. They will also help unify us. Of all the things we can do, this is by far the most important. We want nothing to come in between us as we worship our Lord, and we want nothing to divide us as we serve the Lord and one another in love. Certainly everyone may have a personal opinion, and that is fine. We will, as a congregation, observe those preventative measures which will keep our doors open.

May God the Father continue to protect us and give us good health. May he also provide additional opportunities where we can share the good news of Jesus Christ.

In Christian love, the following was approved at the Congregational Meeting—

- Masks will be worn indoors during the worship service which will allow for singing and speaking
- Hand wipes will be available at the door
- The "touchable" surfaces will be cleaned and disinfected every Saturday
- The fans will be reversed so air moves, but it goes up to the ceiling instead of straight down
- The windows will be kept open for added air circulation
- A fan will be placed in the fire exit (front of church) to exhaust air
- The pastor will wear gloves and a mask for the distribution of the Lord's Supper
- There will be no refreshments for the foreseeable future
- Masks will be worn during fellowship time on the church patio
- The fellowship hall will be available for parents with small children; audio and video will be streamed from the sanctuary
- The live streaming via YouTube will continue every Sunday

One final note, if you are feeling ill, or if you have any COVID symptoms, please do not come to worship on that day.

At the beginning of September, the 20th Anniversary of my installation as Pastor of Our Redeemer was celebrated. I am truly humbled at the love shared by so many. Certainly the last two months have been eventful, but they have been filled with peace. I rejoice that I have the privilege to serve you in this peace, and with this peace. May the Lord continue to bless you and keep you in his love, and may he continue to work through all of us to accomplish his good and gracious will.

Some topics we will cover are —



Reformation Service at St. Paul's First North Hollywood

Usually at the end of October or the first Sunday in November, our Los Angeles Circuit would hold a combined Reformation Service. The service would include a mass choir from all the congregations in Circuit, a grade school choir, as well as handbells, and other instrumentalists. This year will be different. Because North Hollywood is under more stringent restrictions to address the

outbreak of COVID, large groups of people worshipping indoors is not permitted at this time.

Consequently, we will have our regular Sunday morning service and emphasize the Reformation in our own special way. This will include congregational singing, a special order of worship with the Lord's Supper, and our handbell choir.
