It used to be a new year would offer the hope of something different. It would be like a breath of fresh air. But as 2020 slowly waned and became 2021, all of us may have come to the same conclusion—not much is going to change. The biggest disappointment is the stranglehold COVID has on everything. Businesses remain closed. Gatherings are prohibited. Even worship is a causality of governmental mandates. The most disappointing thing I heard regarding the new year is that things will get worse before they get better. It is not the news anyone wants to hear. As the struggles with increased infections continue, and as many local small businesses remain shuttered, it leads us to wonder, "what's next?"

What's next, indeed! It is going to be interesting to see how long this pandemic lingers. It could be anywhere from a couple of months to potentially next year. We all pray for it to be over and for people to be safe. Yet there is a nagging reality from which we cannot escape. We really don't know. So, what is our course of action? And what if, God forbid, this persists for another year?

Only recently have the psychological effects of school closures, lock downs and stay at home orders been considered. The news isn't good. Suicides are up. Drug and physical abuse is skyrocketing. People are changing, and not for the better. This is the unseen tragedy, and it makes us wonder, "what's next?"

As believers in Jesus Christ we have an advantage over many people. Seriously! We are not subject to fear and uncertainty because we know God is in control. We also know everything will work for our blessing. If this weren't sufficient encouragement, we even live with the promise our Lord will never allow anything to come into our lives that he doesn't provide the strength or faith to overcome it. This means our most intimidating challenge is remembering what our Lord will do for us.

It gets us back to the exclamation, what's next! It can be said in frustration, dismay, even hopelessness. It can express a sense of loss and complete failure. How sad, if we fall into this trap. We need to be aware the devil is the origin of this trap. He embraces frustration. He yearns for dismay. He rejoices when hopelessness seizes the heart. We always need to be aware of his destructive and deadly intentions. The last thing we would ever want him to do is get his foot into the door of our lives.

You and I need to ask ourselves a few critical questions, and it may not be comfortable. Are we stronger in our faith today, or has it suffered during the pandemic? Are we excited about more opportunities for new ministry, or are we complaining because things are so difficult? Have we thanked the Lord for every blessing we daily receive, or are we burdened by all the things we have had to forfeit?

These questions should be a wake up call. They should also lead us to humbly repent. It may be that we have unwittingly adopted an attitude of frustration, dismay and hopelessness. We may have even entertained doubts about the Lord and his loving kindness. If we have reached this state, then we need to recommit ourselves to a renewed and regular study of the Scriptures. This is the only remedy for the ills perpetuated and made worse by the world. The Word opens our eyes to all the good things with which the Lord fills our lives. The Word strengthens our hearts to overcome feelings of loss, disappointment and despair. The Word proclaims God's great, undeserved love for each of us.

This is where we need to focus our undivided attention—on what the Lord has done and continues to do for us every day. Sure it's hard because of the many distractions we face. It will also hurt to see how wrong our assumptions tend to be. But, this is a good thing.

When we focus our attention on the Lord, "what's next," takes on a completely different perspective. Instead of looking at everything as being just one more loss, we see it as an opportunity for an additional blessing. In true excitement and anticipation we can say, "what's next?" The answer is more undeserved blessings from the Lord's treasure store of grace. Each can be received with thanksgiving. Each can be received with joyful confidence. Each can be a reminder he will more than supply our needs.

So, "what's next?" I don't claim to have a crystal ball. Nor do I assume to have any special insight into the future. What I do have is a Bible filled with God's precious promises. Ones that are not foolishly made, nor ever broken. God's promises are made in complete faithfulness and unyielding commitment. God's promises are made certain because they come from the sure foundation of his love for us in Jesus. This is something tangible to which we can hold with all our strength. It means every day we can live our lives to the fullest. Every day we can sing songs of praise to the Lord loud and long. Every day we can live with an unshakable and joy-filled hope.

What our Lord promises to do, leads me to recall a song written by Stephen Bautista—"Brand New Day." Maybe you remember he performed it at Our Redeemer several years back. This song really says it all. It considers the pessimism of daily life, and replaces it with the confidence of living in the Lord's complete and unfailing care—a care that is new every day.

## **WELS Investment Fund**

Our Redeemer has an Endowment Fund managed by the WELS Investment Fund (WIF). The Endowment Fund was set up in 2006 with an initial investment of \$51,000. Over the years the Endowment Fund has a grown (with some additional periodic contribution of money into the Fund by ORLC members in addition to investment returns) to \$433, 926 as of the end of 2020.

The Endowment Fund started the year 2020 with a balance of \$359,479 and ended the year with a balance of \$433,926.

We believe the WIF managers are doing a good job as fiduciaries of our Endowment Fund and we plan to continue to use the WIF the coming year as well.

# 2021 Budget Report

The congregation's 2021 budget is broken out into nine (9) categories as shown below:

In 2020 we saw a year over year decline in the General Fund by \$2,900. We ended 2020 with a balance of \$33,940 which is a 7.9% decline in the General Fund in the past year.

Our Synod is not increasing Pastor's health, dental, and pension benefit costs which is a big saving for us in 2021.

For the year 2021, we are planning for offerings to just cover expenses; hence the 4.1% planned decline in expected offerings. We realize that 2020 was a challenging year (to say the least); however, we expect that sometime around mid-year (and possibly sooner) we will see a return to a more normal worship service and more participation from members in the life of the church.

Please prayerfully consider the financial gifts God has entrusted to your stewardship and then help us meet the approved budget so we can continue to proclaim the gospel to a dying world.


