## "Strength in Weakness"

When we read through Paul's Epistles, there are many powerful and encouraging passages. These we know and depend on daily. At the same time there are also some passages used by Paul which make us wonder. One in particular is recorded in his Second letter to the Christians in Corinth:

The first and second letters do not offer a seamless transition. The first letter dealt with serious problems within the church. Most came from not following God's Word and living in an unchristian, worldly way. The people listened to Paul's discipline, repented, and addressed the problems. This is why the second letter has a different tone. There were still challenges and issues, but they had been addressed by sound Scriptural teaching. The major issue which Paul needed to address was an attack on his ministry and his authority as an apostle of lesus.

Various teachers had descended on the congregation in Paul's absence. Not only did they raise doubts about Paul ministry, they also offered substitute teachings which were attractive to those who heard them. These teachers also attacked Paul as a man. Every possible insult was launched against him. Sadly, they were effective because many people began questioning their allegiance to Paul and following these new inspirational and energetic teachers.

Instead of arguing or cowering before these attackers, Paul met them head on. He did it in a most unusual and extraordinary way. Consider what he wrote regarding himself and his credentials as an apostle:

"Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this, that he would take it away from me. And he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, because my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will be glad to boast all the more in my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may shelter me. That is why I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties, for the sake of Christ. For when I am weak, then I am strong."

(2 Corinthians 12:8-10)

Did you catch Paul's rationale? "I will be glad to boast all the more about my weaknesses." This didn't make sense to most people. Why would Paul be glad to boast about his weakness rather than his strengths? For Paul the answer was obvious, "for whenever I am weak, then I am strong."

We live in a world where strength, worldly wisdom, and affluence are glorified. If

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one happens to be weak, unwise by human standards, or an ordinary person, you really don't matter. This affects us in our walk with the Lord. Because strength is admired, we have a tendency to rely on ourselves first. Then when everything is chaotic and completely out of control, we desperately turn to the Lord for help. In a way, we treat him as we would a fire extinguished. He's good to have around in case of an emergency.

So, how well does this work? Experience reveals it doesn't. It doesn't work that well from the Lord's perspective either. This is why we need to carefully consider what Paul is saying.

What does it require to say, "I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions and difficulties?" It requires the right perspective, and Paul provides that. He explains it simply and directly—"for the sake of Christ."

People can have incredibly difficult lives. They can endlessly labor without seeing measurable results. They can sacrifice everything, but in the end, there is nothing to show for it. They can have every good intention, but nothing works out. This is what happens when things are done from a worldly perspective. It isn't this way when things are done for the sake of the Lord.

Paul presents a completely different perspective—it is not about me, it is about Christ. This means Jesus' will is my first priority and my greatest joy. When I make this my focus, nothing else compares or matters as much. This thinking makes us recall the words Paul spoke to the congregation in Philippi: "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain for me." Life would offer fruitful and faithful service for Paul. Death meant eternal life in heaven. When you compare what we do for the sake of Jesus, and what we do for ourselves, there is no comparison.

This was why Paul was able to endure weakness and still conclude he was strong. In his weakness he depended all the more on the Lord—just like we do.

This is not a bad thing. Certainly the world scoffs at our dependence on the Lord. Let them scoff and ridicule. We know what our life is about. We also know what the Lord accomplishes in our weakness. Furthermore, we know the Lord is always there with his undeserved love and power.

It shouldn't be that surprising. When we recognize our weaknesses, we readily look to the Lord with greater urgency and more sincere prayers. We avail ourselves to his gracious strength. However, it is when all is well and we appear to be in control that we tend to forget about the Lord—our Refuge, Strength, and Help. We can also become overly confident in ourselves. This is when our fall is inevitable. You and I need to start with the undeniable reality. We are weak. We are unprepared to meet the challenges of living in this world. We are confused as to where we can find true strength. This is why we need the Lord and his perfect strength.

It is obvious, we are living in strange times with strange events. We are often confused by the lack of truth and certainty. We are tired. We are worn. We pray for God to intervene. But he seems to be delayed. Instead of angrily responding to what we would rather see, let's look at what we know. God continues to be in control. God continues to use his wisdom and power for our blessing. God continues to strengthen us when we are worn and weary. This is why we need to accept with complete confidence Paul's perspective: "for whenever I am weak, I am strong."

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The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you.

## Beach, Bike, Barbeque

## "More Than Fair"

"But he answered one of them, 'Friend, I am not being unfair to you. Didn't you agree to work for a denarius? Take your pay and go. I want to give the man who was hired last the same as I gave you. Don't I have the right to do what I want with my own money? Or are you envious because I am generous?" Matthew 20:13-15

Some people might argue that God isn't fair. He doesn't punish quickly enough. He doesn't punish severely enough. He even allows bad things to happen to good people. God's fairness is further questioned when it comes to people entering heaven. It doesn't seem fair that some people are excluded. While I might be tempted to think God is unfair, I need to remember the truth which Jesus teaches. God is more than fair.

Jesus' parable of the workers in the field (Matthew 20:1-16) reveals God's goodness and his mercy. The landowner, who is the Lord, graciously calls many to come into his field. Some are there a long time. Others are there only a short time. At the final accounting, the Lord gives everyone what he promised. Unfortunately, the fairness and the generosity of the Lord is called into question.

The landowner's response is critical. "Are you envious because I am generous?" The parable addressed the jealousy of the descendants of Abraham who assumed they deserved more from the Lord. The Lord's answer offers them a completely different perspective, and it becomes a valuable lesson for me when I harbor concerns about the Lord's fairness.

While I may be tempted to think I deserve more from the Lord, I need to start with what I actually deserved. I should have been punished, rejected and separated from God forever. My sin is the reason why God should have turned away from me. God's love, however, brought about a different response. Through the sacrificial work of Jesus, as well as through the substitution of his righteousness for my lack thereof, I am saved. If God would have been fair, none of this would have happened. God would have fairly judged me and sentenced me to eternal punishment.

Through his wonderful love the Lord leads me to rejoice in my rescue and the promise of heaven. It also leads me to rejoice that God offers the same rescue and promise of heaven to all people. He wants all to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. This is more than fair. It is grace.
