"Outgrowing God"

Just recently a book was brought to my attention. Its title sparked my interest, but not sufficiently to make me read the from book cover to cover. The title is "Outgrowing God," and the author is Richard Dawkins. Some of you may recognize his name, or have even read some of his books. He has earned a reputation for not only questioning the existence of God, but actually taking it to an antagonistic, even argumentative level.

Certainly there are some who laud his work, and promote it extensively. This latest volume will probably bring him similar accolades. While I haven't read it completely, I did read enough to draw some conclusions.

The premise is intriguing: "Outgrowing God." Still, it actually reminded me of an old German proverb: "If God were no greater than me, what kind God could he be." The proverb explains one of the devil's time tested and well used temptations. It harkens back to the Garden of Eden where he deceived Adam and Eve into believing they could be like God knowing good and evil. His ruse was simple, and remains the same. He comes with the deception that people can be like God. They can make their own decisions. They can pick and choose what they believe or reject. They can make their own rules by which they live. There is only one major obstacle. If God were like me, what kind of God would he be?" Selfish? Arrogant? Self-centered? Unforgiving? If God were like humans, this is the kind of God he would be.

Now consider a book with the title, "Outgrowing God." It ultimately promotes the idea that people should grow beyond their reliance on, or acknowledgement of God. It sounds attractive, even desirable. Still, what does it really mean?

When we outgrow God, it means we don't need him any more. We don't need his control, his preservation, his wisdom, or his love. Just consider for a moment, if we would replace the Lord as the ones who were in control. Quite simply and very quickly, everything would go out of control. From the laws of nature to the weather, and even in the mundane aspects of our life, chaos would rule supreme. The same could be said about God's preservation. How would we stand against evil in the world? How would we escape the disasters and cataclysmic catastrophes? How would we make it from one day to the next? Then, what about wisdom, who would determine right or wrong, good or bad, wise or foolish. Everything would be judged by an indeterminate moral subjectivism. In the end, anything could be justified, because it would be what I would want.

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Pandemonium would soon become the norm, since everyone would be living for themselves and by their own rules. Still, the worst thing which would happen would be the loss of God's love. If we outgrow God, we also outgrow his love for us. This would make life a "living hell." Some might argue this is an overstatement or exaggeration, but consider how the Bible actually describes hell. In the Gospels it is explained as a place "where the fire never stops burning and the worms (maggots) never stop eating." Even more descriptive is that hell is a place where one is completely separated from God and from his love. This is the real danger of outgrowing God.

Now, most would probably admit, "I wouldn't want that! I wouldn't want my life to be devoid of the Lord!" This is all well and good, but we may need to rethink what our decisions and actions might actually say.

The First Commandment teaches "we should fear, love, and trust in God above all things." The Lord is the one we hold in complete awe, honor with undivided love, and follow with uncompromised trust—and, always without exception. What do our lives reveal from time to time? God may be important, but not important enough to put him above all our personal plans. God may be loved, but his love is often unequally divided when it has to compete with love for ourselves. God may be trusted, but only to a point.

We live in a time when our fear, love, and trust for the Lord are tested on a daily basis. There are all sorts of mandates, demands, requirements, and laws which conflict more and more with the open and unimpeded worship of the Lord. Do we put these first? Do we believe good citizenship is a priority to God's desire for faithful worship and fellowship? Do we trust the opinions and wisdom of humans who claim to have a firm grasp of the truth, or do we put our lives into the Lord's hands who is the source of Truth?

While we may not have reached the dangerous plateau of outgrowing God, we do flirt with living our lives more and more apart from him. So, what do we do? The first thing we need to do is pray. Pray for wisdom, understanding, strength, boldness, and especially forgiveness. Then we need to faithfully acknowledge the promises the Lord has given us, promises which have never failed, nor will ever fail. We also need to understand the importance of regular fellowship at both worship and the Lord's Supper. These are for the strengthening of our faith and the grace to serve him with a God-pleasing life. Last, but certainly not least, we need to trust what the Lord clearly tells us. Paul understood, and rejoiced in the unsurpassed encouragement which comes from the truth of Scripture when he wrote:

Yes, and I will continue to rejoice, because I know that this will turn out for my deliverance, through your prayer and the support of the Spirit of Jesus Christ. This matches my earnest expectation and hope that I will in no way be put to shame, but with all boldness, as always, so even now, Christ will be magnified in my body, whether by life or by death. Yes, for me to live is Christ, and to die is gain. But if I am to go on living in the flesh, that will mean fruitful labor for me. Yet which should I prefer? I do not know. I am pulled in two directions, because I have the desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far. But is it more necessary for your sake that I remain in the flesh. And since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and will continue with all of you, for your progress and joy in the faith. (Philippians I:19-25)



No danger, thirst, or hunger, no pain or poverty, No earthly tyrant's anger shall ever vanquish me. Though earth should break asunder, you are my Savior true; No fire or sword or thunder shall sever me from you.

My heart for joy is springing and can no more be sad, 'Tis full of joy and singing, sees only sunshine glad. The sun that cheers my spirit is Jesus Christ, my King; The heaven I shall inherit makes me rejoice and sing.

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
Absolute Loyalty to the Word

"Reformation 2021"

On Sunday, October 24, 2021, twelve members of Our Redeemer gathered for a Reformation Celebration. A buffet dinner was served in the Fellowship Hall and included entrees of traditional "German" food and well as "American" food. We even had some authentic German beer!

After dinner, we went to the sanctuary to view the original black and white film "Martin Luther." This was the movie first produced in 1953 that was nominated for two Academy awards and received rave reviews from movie critics. The film covered Luther's life between 1505 and 1530 A.D. and the birth of the Protestant Reformation. We were reminded again of how God worked through Luther to give him the insight and courage to stand firm on the Word of God, even to the point of death, and the importance of the Word and Sacraments to keep us in the faith.

Desserts were served after the movie ended. It was noted that despite, by today's standards, the sub-optimal production values, this is still considered the most accurate portrayal of the events in Luther's life during this crucial turning point in world history.

It was great to be able to have this Reformation celebration at Our Redeemer because the usual Los Angeles circuit Reformation service at St. Paul's in North Hollywood was canceled this year due to health mitigation mandates for Los Angeles county as a result of the pandemic.

Sunday School


