"Stop Being Troubled"

During the most crucial time of his ministry, Jesus offers a most comforting assurance. In the Upper Room prior to his death, Jesus offered words of encouragement to his disciples. He knew how they were going to be tested. He understood the temptations they would endure. He realized without his reassurance, they would fall from faith.

Chapters thirteen through seventeen of the Gospel of John are wonderful reminders of Jesus' great concern for his disciples. The most significant portion of this discourse is where Jesus says:

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions. If it were not so, I would have told you. I am going to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and take you to be with me, so that you may also be where I am" (John 14:1-3).

While the disciples didn't immediately comprehend the significance of this promise, they did come to cherish and rely on it later. Through historical records of the early Church, we know that many of the disciples endured persecution and death for the sake of the Gospel. Only John died of natural causes, but he was in exile. Every step of the way, they were not troubled because they knew what Jesus had promised them. They believed God the Father and his word. They believed Jesus and his promise. This afforded them the peace to endure even death as martyrs. They had this confidence because they knew death would not be the end. It would simply be the beginning of eternal life in heaven.

Nothing has changed for us in the 21st Century. We live in critical times. We are confronted by crucial decisions. We often find ourselves in conflict. Our hearts are troubled. They are also burdened and weary. So, how should we understand the words spoken by our Savior? Even more important, do they still apply to us?

A good place to start would be to listen to what Jesus is actually saying. We know what troubles are, because we experience them regularly. Yet our understanding of trouble is not exactly what Jesus explains. The Greek word means "to stir up, or agitate." You could picture a quiet pool without a ripple on it. Then, imagine a large rock being thrown into it. The first thing you would see is the huge splash. The water is disturbed. What follows are the ripples emanating from where the rock landed. They spread to the shore, then they return from where they originated. This

is the disturbance or trouble which Jesus explains. It is not just the initial shock, but it is the continuing affect of the ripples returning and hitting us again and again.

I believe all of us have experienced this kind of trouble. A rock has dropped in the middle of our tranquility and upset it. The sad part is, we never seem to find the peace we lost in the first place. When we endure these troubling and perplexing times, Jesus says, "Stop giving into them. Stop letting your hearts be troubled!"

If it were only that easy! We try to resist the urge of being upset, perplexed, or troubled, but our best efforts tend to fail. So, we yearn for peace, but never really achieve it. This is when we need to remember where our Lord directs us. It is to him, and to what his Father promises.


Our Lord and Savior has prepared a place of incomparable peace for us. It is a private room, or mansion, where we can find the tranquility we could never find in this life. It is a place prepared especially for each of us, a place where we will be face to face in the presence of our Lord.

It almost sounds too good to be true. Yet, it is! Our confidence, namely our reason to believe, comes

because Jesus said, "he has prepared that place for us." He does this individually and specifically for each of us. The other reason why we can be so confident is that he gave up his life so we could receive this place of peace.

Let's face it, the reason we are troubled is that we continuously throw rocks of sin, disobedience and rebellion into the tranquil pool of our life. Peace is shattered and the ripples continue to disrupt. By ourselves we can not escape the consequences of our sin. Nor can we escape the condemnation God places on that sin, and on us.

This is why we need to cherish the words and work of our Savior. Through his faithfulness, our sin is forgiven. Condemnation is removed. Peace is restored. This is why we can put to rest all the things that trouble and perplex us. Now, compare what Jesus has done with eve-



rything this world offers. Absolutely nothing can match the peace he established and has given us through faith.

As a result, we can look at 2022 from a completely different perspective. Of course, there are going to be problems. There will be confusing and perplexing times. There will even be times where the anxiety of life will cause all sorts of unrest and ripples. Still, in the middle of these turbulent and chaotic times, there is peace. That peace is given to us by a Savior who has claimed us as his own, who has made us his own through his precious, redeeming work, and who keeps us as his own until we receive the place he has prepared for us.

Make no mistake, all this is ours, just as it was the disciples'. We can believe God the Father. We can believe Jesus our Savior. A place is prepared for us. We are the Lord's in life and in death. For this reason, we do not have to let our hearts be troubled.



It was a very enjoyable event and we thank all those who showed up to help out and bring food and beverages.




Wednesday Evening Bible Study


Sunday School for Children
