"Mounting a Sure Defense"

In his First Epistle to the Christian Church, Peter issues a sober warning. He writes: "Have sound judgment. Be alert. Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour (1 Peter 5:8). It is an ominous picture. It should cause us to be on our guard continually, and never think the good fight of faith is complete. The sad reality is, the world has influenced our flesh not to take this warning seriously. We begin to convince ourselves we have nothing to worry about. Besides, we are strong enough and should be able to resist the open attacks of the devil. Here is where we have to acknowledge we have a problem. The moment we do not take the devil's machinations seriously, this is when he takes control of the battle. He delights when we believe we are alright just the way we are.

While we might want to debate this point, the bottom line is, by ourselves we cannot mount a sure and certain defense. By ourselves we grow weary. We lack the strength and perseverance needed for daily combat. We even find ourselves thinking giving up is an option. The battle is far too long and hard. We may also just lose interest.

This inability to mount a sure defense became apparent during COVID. At the same time, now in its waning days, we see just as many challenges. Worse yet, we are tired. We are frustrated. We long for some semblance of normalcy. Yet, none of these can be found.

The stand we took throughout masking, personal distancing, and confining ourselves to our homes has taken its toll. Things which brought us joy no longer offer the same joy. At the same time, joys are tentative waiting for what's next. Sadly as a result, there are people who have lost the desire to battle the devil and their flesh, and have withdrawn from worship.

One could debate some of the reasons offered for not worshipping the way one used to before COVID. The real reason is found in the heart. When we examine our hearts, what do we see? Is there a joy as expressed by the psalmist who said, "I was glad when they said to me, let us go into the house of the Lord?" Is there an insatiable appetite to receive the body and blood of our Savior for the forgiveness of our sins and the grace to serve him with a God-pleasing life? Is there a joyful commitment to support the Gospel ministry of Our Redeemer with regular, generous, and first fruit offerings? Or, is there something a little less going on in the heart?

I have had several conversations with people encouraging them to become more active again. The response is usually, "Yes, but." This answer does not provide any

real defense against the devil. If anything, it puts one in greater danger of his wiles and deadly ways.

The only sure defense we can mount is the one our Savior already accomplished. In his Word he reassures us the battle is won and the devil is defeated. The only way to have this confidence is through the means the Lord has provided. It includes the daily study of his Word. It further includes the regular reception of the Lord's Supper. It even includes weekly "in person worship." Live streaming can be a good, temporary substitute, but it cannot equal or replace gathering with the saints for the mutual encouragement we desperately need. It might be assumed watching the live stream is comparable. It isn't. While I was blessed to be able to watch the live stream for a period of time, what I missed the most was the fellowship of the saints—saints gathering together to praise the Lord. It's possible we may not truly appreciate the encouragement and example of others as much as we should.

Also, let's be realistic, which provides the more certain defense—going into battle alone, or going into battle with the support of others who are facing the same struggles? The answer is obvious.

So, what do we need to learn and put into practice? We cannot fight spiritual battles alone. We will fail. We do not have the strength or determination to put on the full armor of God and battle our enemies daily. In time we will give up when the battle grows long and hard. Consequently, to mount a sure defense, we need what our Savior offers—his life, his strength, his reassurance, and his love. These prepare us to fight and win. We also need his forgiveness, his resurrection, and his righteousness. These proclaim the victory is already won, and we are more than conquerors. We also need faith. Faith to follow, faith to trust, and faith to be completely confident. Without a faith firmly built on our Lord and his Word, we will never mount a sure, or certain defense. It is also what makes the words of the hymnist so precious —

Jesus Christ, my sure defense and my Savior now is living!
Knowing this, my confidence rests upon the hope he's giving,
Though the night of death be fraught
still with many an anxious thought.

No, too closely am I bound unto him by hope forever;
Faith's strong hand the rock has found, grasped it,
and will leave it never.

Even death now cannot part from its Lord the trusting heart.

Glorified, I shall anew with this flesh then be enshrouded; In this body I shall view God, my Lord, with eyes unclouded; In this flesh I then shall see Jesus Christ eternally.

General Fund Analysis

Treasurer's Report as Of August 2022 Month End

The General Fund comprises money (offerings) that is used for the on-going ministry and operations at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church. This fund is NOT used for special projects such as the recent building painting project, the purchase of new picnic tables for the front of the church, and similar "off-budget" projects. It can be looked at as what it takes to fund our day-to-day Gospel outreach ministry. This includes everything from monthly utility bills, to maintenance, and compensation for our called worker.


As can be seen by the accompanying graph of the General Fund Balance, we are at an almost historic low in the General Fund at \$13,129. This amount, \$13,129, is one month's support. The balance was only lower 15 years ago in 2007 when almost everything (gas, electricity, water, etc.) was much cheaper.

Is it possible our personal offerings are not keeping up with expenses? We are falling short by about \$2,500 per month on average for the past 18 months with a precipitous drop since year end 2021.

Although there are a variety of reasons for the decrease in giving, it most generally coincides with the most recent pandemic and the associated lock downs and other restrictions imposed by both the Federal and State governments. Recent Christian church surveys indicate a very significant drop in the number of people attending worship services in all denominations.

I offer this explanation because we have been blessed with the same faithful Lord and Savior, the same church location, the same basic activities, regular worship opportunities, bible classes, and the same Pastor as when we were meeting and sometimes exceeding our projected offerings.

So, we need to ask ourselves are we taking Paul's words to heart—excel in the grace of giving?
