## "Gift Exchange?"

Christmas is a time of exchanging gifts, greetings, and good wishes. The greetings and good wishes seems to last, and always continue to brighten our days long after Christmas. The exchanging of gifts sometimes doesn't work as well. I think everyone has received one of those "gifts." The ones you really don't want or need, yet you receive them with thanks and appreciation. Sometimes, you may even say, "Oh, you shouldn't have." While you may conjure up some semblance of appreciation, you still feel, what am I going to do with this? You could "regift" it, but what it if somehow it ends up with the original giver? You could put it into the back of the closet, but the space is already full of similar gifts. You could possibly throw it away, but again, what if the giver asks, "What ever happened to that gift I gave you?" There is one final option. It could be exchanged for something else.

It used to be the return and exchange departments were the busiest places in the store after Christmas. This has changed with greater online purchasing. Still returns are pretty common. The wrong size. The wrong color. Maybe the gift was just wrong. So, an exchange is planned and made. It might be for credit, or it might be for a different gift more to one's liking.

Exchanges can be simple. They can also become complicated. We always hope for the best, and with rare exception, they usually work out.

At Christmas there is one gift we already know we are receiving. It is the gift of God the Father, namely his Son, our new-born Savior. There is no other gift which can compare with what God the Father gives. It is perfect, complete in every way. Still, some who receive this gift exchange it for something else. It may be intentional, or it may be unintentional. It happens though. Sadly the exchange typically happens prior to the celebration of Jesus' birth, and it reaches its zenith on the day of. People who hold the gift of Jesus in their hands make the decision to exchange this gift for what the world offers.

Now there is nothing wrong with celebrating Christmas, as long as we don't exchange what is important for what is superficial. Gifts, decorations, trees, parties, dinners, and a myriad of other things are on our minds. We grapple to find enough time, and we fret because we might not be ready for Christmas. But is this what Christmas should become? Is this what the birth of Christ should be? If it is, we have just exchanged God's great, indescribable gift of grace for a few trinkets, some bright lights, and fleeting joy.

It's no wonder, depression and disappointment rates tend to soar around Christmas. It is also interesting to listen to people air their comments, "I thought this year would be better, or at least different." We have to be honest. Without Jesus Christ Christmas is nothing more than the world's pressure to spend money, to over plan our schedules, and to be constantly tired. Again, it if this is what Christmas has become, we have exchanged God's gift for something considerably less valuable.

So what should we do? Get rid of everything? Stop giving presents? Make Christmas like any other day? I am not advocating eliminating traditions and practices. At the same time, these thing should never become the controlling force at this time of year. I remember several times when we didn't put up a tree, or only a small tree with Jesus ornaments on it. We never found the time to send out cards. Also, the only presents were those specifically needed. I'm sure some people would be horrified, and conclude, "This isn't Christmas at all!" However, it was one of the better Christmas celebrations I remember, because we simply focused on the gift God gave us—his Son. Another memorable Christmas was my very first in the ministry. Everything was prepared and set to go until the snow started falling early in the week. By the time Christmas came around no one was able to go anywhere. Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and the Sunday after Christmas were all canceled. I spent those days quietly celebrating by myself. I had no tree, no presents, and no real plans for company. Still, nothing was lacking, because it made me look past everything I didn't have, and relish the things I did—the simple message of the angels: "Today, a Savior is born for you. He is Christ the Lord!" I wouldn't have exchanged either of those Christmas celebrations for any other.

I guess this quiet approach has always stayed with me. It is the simplicity of the celebration which produces the greatest joy. It is the beauty of God's gifts which brings the greatest meaning. It is the message of Jesus' birth which offers the greatest peace.

So, while we are making all our plans and preparations for December 24th and December 25th, we can't afford to lose sight of what makes those days so special. Remember what God the Father has done! Remember the gift he is giving you in Jesus! Remember the great, undeserved love you have received through faith! There is nothing which can compare, and nothing which will ever compare with knowing we have a Savior born for our rescue.


