Participation & Children

Sometimes parents (and even churches) think that worship is not a place for children. At Our Redeemer, we're convinced that nothing could be further from the truth. We want children in church worshiping with their families and learning about Jesus' love for them. Why?

- Even from the earliest of ages, **children are models of faith** from which we can all learn (Luke 18:16,17). Similarly, they learn how to "do church" by watching mom and dad.
- Our worship format not only encourages families to be together, but is ideally suited for activer worship engagement and participation by all, including children, balancing new service elements each week with regular repetition for learning and memorization.
- The **sights and sounds of active children** within our congregation are a great joy to us and **evidence that God is blessing our future even now!**

We realize that, especially at first, having children in church can be a challenge for parents. To help, we offer the following:

- If your child needs a moment, an area in the fellowship hall building is open. It is located just to the left as you exit church. A broadcast of the service is also in this room.
- Other families are willing and ready to help. Let us know if we can offer a hand with your little ones.
- Activity sheets that kids can work on throughout the service are available on the stand in the back.

Current Series: Undivided Attention

We live in a world where a thousand things are competing for our attention. There is the real danger that we focus on the frivolous and ignore the indispensable. As a result, we often talk about the importance of being "free from distraction." But the stakes are higher than that. We need to be *freed* from distraction. We need the spiritual power to give our undivided attention to that which truly makes a difference, not only here and now, but also in eternity. A life focused on all the right things is only possible because of a Savior who is always focused on us. Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to give his followers power and focus. Still today, through his Word, Jesus grants those gifts to his disciples.

Service Focus

Along with Jesus' disciples we say, "Lord, teach us to pray" (Lk II:I).

The pastor announces forgiveness to the penitent congregation. He appeals to the sacrifice of Jesus Christ as the basis for the full and free forgiveness of sins.

Song of Praise

This song reminds us that the Christian, forgiven through Christ, wants to serve him with body and soul. We pray for lives that live in Jesus' holiness with him as our guide. The author of this mid-19th-century hymn was a timber merchant who wrote quite a lot of poetry and hymns for children.

Children's Devotion

Abraham prays on the basis of what he knows about the LORD: that the LORD is a just judge, that the LORD shows mercy, and that the LORD invites us to be bold in our prayers.

First Reading

Genesis 18:20-32

²⁰ Then the LORD said, "The outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah is so great and their sin so grievous ²¹ that I will go down and see if what they have done is as bad as the outcry that has reached me. If not, I will know."

²²The men turned away and went toward Sodom, but Abraham remained standing before the LORD. ²³Then Abraham approached him and said: "Will you sweep away the righteous with the wicked? ²⁴What if there are fifty righteous people in the city? Will you really sweep it away and not spare the place for the sake of the fifty righteous people in it? ²⁵ Far be it from you to do such a thing—to kill the righteous with the wicked, treating the righteous and the wicked alike. Far be it from you! Will not the Judge of all the earth do right?"

²⁶ The LORD said, "If I find fifty righteous people in the city of Sodom, I will spare the whole place for their sake."

²⁷Then Abraham spoke up again: "Now that I have been so bold as to speak to the Lord, though I am nothing but dust and ashes, ²⁸ what if the number of the righteous is five less than fifty? Will you destroy the whole city for lack of five people?"

"If I find forty-five there," he said, "I will not destroy it."

²⁹Once again he spoke to him, "What if only forty are found there?"

He said, "For the sake of forty, I will not do it."

³⁰ Then he said, "May the Lord not be angry, but let me speak. What if only thirty can be found there?"

He answered, "I will not do it if I find thirty there."

³¹Abraham said, "Now that I have been so bold as to speak to the Lord, what if only twenty can be found there?"


He said, "For the sake of twenty, I will not destroy it."





He drew inspiration from the Gospel accounts of Jesus teaching his disciples how to pray, particularly from Luke 11:1-4 and Matthew 6:9-13. The hymn is structured as a prayer, asking for divine instruction and guidance in approaching God through prayer.

¹One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples."

²He said to them, "When you pray, say:

" 'Father.

hallowed be your name, your kingdom come.

³Give us each day our daily bread.

⁴ Forgive us our sins,

for we also forgive everyone who sins against us.

And lead us not into temptation."

⁵Then Jesus said to them, "Suppose you have a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; ⁶ a friend of mine on a journey has come to me, and I have no food to offer him.' ⁷And suppose the one inside answers, 'Don't bother me. The door is already locked, and my children and I are in bed. I can't get up and give you anything.' ⁸I tell you, even though he will not get up and give you the bread because of friendship, yet because of your shameless audacity he will surely get up and give you as much as you need.

⁹ "So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. ¹⁰ For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened.

"Which of you fathers, if your son asks for a fish, will give him a snake instead? ¹² Or if he asks for an egg, will give him a scorpion? ¹³ If you then, though you are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!" My Christian Life - Lord, Teach Us to Pray //

By his work as my Savior, Jesus opens up the lines of communication I have with the almighty and loving God in heaven. I have the privilege of coming to him in prayer. I want to respond to this gift by ...

Setting a reminder to pray daily (using an alarm on my phone, a prominent note, a prayer book in a conspicuous spot, etc.). I don't want to stop praying about something just because an answer hasn't come yet.
Using my role as a parent, grandparent, or mentor to actively teach a child or a new-to the-faith Christian how to pray using the Lord's Prayer as a model or the ACTS model (<u>A</u> dortation, <u>C</u> onfession, <u>T</u> hanksgiving, <u>S</u> upplication [asking].
Joining the <i>Our Redeemer Prayer Chain</i> to pray for those whose needs I can bring before God's throne of grace. This will help me to include others in my prayers. (See p. 14 in this bulletin.)

Catechism

Our Father in heaven.

What does this mean?

With these words God tenderly invites us to believe that he is our true Father and that we are his true children, so that we may pray to him as boldly and confidently as dear children ask their dear father.

The Address of the Lord's Prayer and Martin Luther's explanation of the Address from his Small Catechism. In the Prayer of the Church, the congregation agrees on earth what the Father in heaven may do for it. Petitions and thanksgivings are offered for all in authority and for human need.

Prayer of the Church

We give thanks to you, O Lord, with our whole heart. Because you have answered our prayers and delivered us from the midst of trouble, we know, O Lord, that your steadfast love endures forever.

Therefore we are bold to come before you through the merits of Jesus Christ, your Son with these petitions.

We regret, O Lord, that in spite of your loving-kindnesses we have often repaid you with our sins. Our sinful selves have been buried with Christ in Baptism, but we often fail to rise to newness of life.

You have given us ample assurance in your Word that in Christ all our sins are forgiven, yet we often fail to accept this forgiveness with our whole heart.

You have assured us that when we ask, you will give, when we seek, we shall find, and when we knock, it shall be opened to us. Yet we have prayed with less than wholehearted faith in your promises.

We have often abused the Lord's Prayer by saying it without thinking or doubting when we pray. For these and all our transgressions, forgive us, O Lord.

Empower us with your Holy Spirit. May he strengthen our faith in your good providence. Help us to pray with meaning, trusting that we have been redeemed through Christ.

Special prayers of intercession may follow

Here us, Lord, as we bring to you our private petitions.

Silent prayer

Be a source of help to the helpless and a source of hope to the hopeless.

In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

Using the ACTS Prayer Model to Guide Praise & Prayer

The **ACTS** acronym is a simple yet profound framework that helps Christians structure their prayers and focus their hearts in meaningful communication with God. Each letter stands for a key component of prayer: Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication. Using **ACTS** leads to well-rounded prayers that keep God at the center while addressing both our spiritual and personal needs.

A - Adoration

Adoration is the act of praising God simply for who he is – His greatness, holiness, love, and majesty. In this part of prayer, we focus our attention upward, acknowledging God's character and giving Him the worship he deserves. It's about honoring and glorifying God with our words and hearts.

Example: "Lord, you are holy and mighty, the Creator of all things and full of mercy."

ACTS Prayer Model Adoration Praise God for all that He is! Confession Confess your sins and ask to be forgiven. Thanksgiving Thank God for everything He has done, is doing, and will do in your life. Supplication Present your requests to God.

C - Confession

Confession involves humbly acknowledging our sins before God. It is a time of self-examination and repentance, where we bring our failings into the light and seek God's forgiveness. Confession helps us walk in honesty and humility.

Example: "Father, I confess that I have been impatient and self-centered. Please forgive me."

T - Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is expressing gratitude to God for all his blessings—both physical and spiritual. This includes thanking him for answered prayers, his provision, his guidance, and the gift of salvation through Jesus Christ. A thankful heart fosters joy and contentment.

Example: "Thank you, Lord, for my family, for your daily providing, and the hope I have in Jesus."

S - Supplication

Supplication means bringing our requests to God. It involves praying for our own needs as well as interceding on behalf of others. God invites us to bring all our concerns to him, trusting in his wisdom and care. Supplication keeps us dependent on God and reminds us of his power to act.

Example: "Lord, please give me wisdom in my decisions today. Be with my friend who is sick and bring her healing and peace."



Martin Luther and Prayer

Prayer is Commanded by God

Prayer is just as strictly and seriously commanded as all other commandments: to have no other God, not to kill, not to steal, and so on. Let no one think that it makes no difference whether he prays or not. Common people think this, who grope in such delusion and ask, "Why should I pray? Who knows whether God heeds or will hear my prayer? If I do not pray, someone else will." And so they fall into the habit of never praying. - Concordia: The Lutheran Confessions (pp. 408,409).

The Christian Prays Constantly Through the Holy Spirit

Through Christ alone we possess both grace and the granting of prayer, that we first become children of God, entitled to call upon Him, and then also receive what we need for ourselves and for others. Therefore wherever there is a Christian, there is none other than the Holy Spirit, who does nothing but pray without ceasing. Even though one does not move one's lips and form words continuously, one's heart nonetheless does beat incessantly; and, like the pulse and the heart in the body, it beats with sighs such as these: "Oh, dear Father, please let Thy name be hallowed, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done among us and everyone!" And when blows fall, when temptations thicken, and adversity presses harder, then such sighing prayers become more fervent and also find words. A Christian without prayer is just as impossible as a living person without a pulse. The pulse is never motionless; it moves and beats constantly, whether one is asleep or something else keeps one from being aware of it. - Luther's Works: American Edition, vol. 24, p. 89

The Mighty Prayer of a Christian Sigh

A Christian is always praying, whether he is sleeping or waking; for his heart is always praying, and even a little sigh is a great and mighty prayer. For God says: "For the sighing of the needy, now I will arise saith the Lord" (Psalm 12:5). - What Luther Says #3471

Pray for the Spiritual Needs of Others

You would be doing real Christian works if you interested yourself in sinners and went into your private room and earnestly implored God saying: O my God, this is what I hear of so-and-so; that man is lying in sin, and that other one has fallen; O Lord, help him to rise again, etc. - In this way you would assist him and would serve him. - What Luther Says #3516
